Kingston-upon-Thames, and the Surrey/Hants borders

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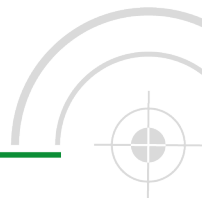

Chairman's AGM Report

We held our first physical Annual General Meeting (AGM) for 3 years on Saturday February 19th at Woking Railway Club. After 3 years wait we nearly didn't have an AGM as Storm Eunice caused havoc with public transport. I was sitting at the Railway Club 15 minutes before the scheduled start discussing with the handful of people there whether we should go ahead. We decided to delay the start by 30 minutes and by that time we had 22 people, so we got started. The usual AGM business was conducted, accounts approved, officials re-elected if they were happy to stand again and a new Public Transport Officer appointed as the previous one had stood down. I was re-elected for another year.

Our branch goals have changed this year, the three goals we have adopted are:

1. To review all our WhatPub entries that say a pub has disabled access and check thoroughly that this is truly the case.
2. To try to make social events inclusive where possible.
3. To keep WhatPub entries up to date.

Members of the Kingston & Leatherhead CAMRA (Campaign for Real Ale) branch made their way to the Royal Oak at West Molesey last Tuesday night to make their Winter Pub Of The Season award to the pub's landlord and landlady, Geoff and Jan Nordemann. The award is made to a pub that has improved over the last twelve months, nominated and voted for by branch members.



Geoff and Jan have been at the Royal Oak for six years now, with Geoff giving up his previous job as a plumber. He had actually been using the pub for thirty-five years and when the tenancy came up, and he and his wife decided to go for it. As Geoff quoted 'He liked it that much he brought it', and a very good job they are doing as well. This was as demonstrated by the number of customers who were enjoying themselves. Including one of their two dart teams who were playing against the pub from across the road. The Royal Oak also has two football teams, as well as supporting local charities, the nearby church and holds carol services.

During the evening the Kingston & Leatherhead branch chairman Richard Russell made the presentation of a framed certificate to Geoff and Jan. All together a well run pub which is well worth a visit to sample some of their excellent ales.

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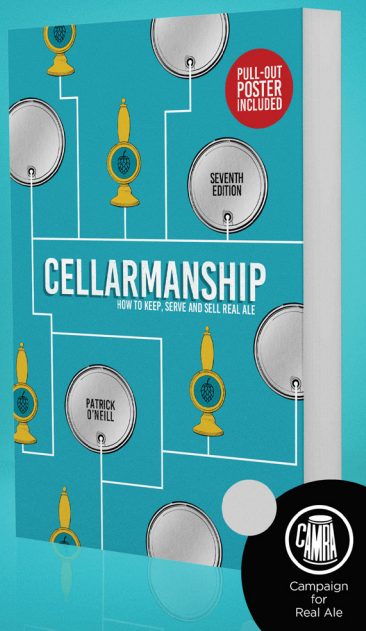
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Keep The White Lion **ROARING!**



The White Lion (20 Lower Farnham Road, Aldershot. GU12 4EA) remains closed and unoccupied but the Community Group (Aldershot Community Pub Limited) set up to buy and run the pub is definitely active and aware!

The owner had planning permission to convert the pub into 4 flats resoundingly REFUSED by Rushmoor Borough Council last August. However, just as News & Ale was going to press, the owner, submitted a new planning application. This application is rather different as they are only seeking to convert the upstairs area to 2 flats, with the downstairs area being retained as a pub, with a new kitchen and toilets being provided, albeit with a smaller trading area.



There are two ways of looking at this, that the loss of the accommodation upstairs would be damaging to the continuing pub business and the owners are simply trying to convert the pub into housing by stealth. Alternatively, the proposal could be viewed as a genuine attempt to provide a viable pub as part of a mixed use development. The owners clearly don't want to run the pub themselves, but now at least appear willing to lease it out to others to do so.

The new owners have to date been unwilling

to engage with ACPL, but perhaps that may now change. As News & Ale went to press the Campaign Group was actively considering its next move, but could the pub be a small step closer to being saved? As things stand the building is deteriorating and its asset value will be steadily decreasing the longer it remains shut.

Meanwhile ACPL is not dormant but is broadening the campaign to support the other Community Pubs of Aldershot, that is to say the non-pubco chain pubs that still provide the Community focus that we wish to re-establish in The White Lion.

The most obvious activity that ACPL is undertaking is a complete redesign of the website www.whitelionaldershot.co.uk and equally important is maintaining the content of the website, which has been static for far too long. By the time this edition of News & Ale is published the website will have been relaunched and able to provide a wealth of information about the campaign to date and the vision for the future.

These fine words come at a cost and ACPL have also set up a GoFundMe account to ask all White Lion and Community Pub supporters to donate what they can afford to keep the campaign active. The GoFundMe link is <https://gofund.me/984fa535>

Note that GoFundMe donations are just that, donations, and should The White Lion become available to buy then a separate Crowdfunder account will be established to sell shares for the community purchase of the pub.

ALDERSHOT

Funky End

Reopened in November after being closed for over a year. Little appears to have changed in terms of décor; no real ale is sold. **Kevin Travers**

Garden Gate

This fantastic community pub, continues to be the only pub in Aldershot to regularly sell the superb Surrey Hills Ranmore, which was in great form when visiting recently and it remains their best seller. The pub also houses a community defibrillator and was busy training a number of locals to use it recently - a great initiative. **KT**

Mytigar (Albion)

Pleased to report that a planning application to convert the pub to flats has been refused by Rushmoor Council because it failed to meet the Council's Pub Protection Policy. Sadly the pub continues to operate as a kitchen to a Nepalese catering business, and is rarely open to the public. **KT**

ASHFORD

Ash Tree

A large Fuller's pub serving the usual range of ales and pub grub. The pub was closed for several weeks in February, but reopened at beginning of March. **Robert Veryard**

BAGSHOT

Foresters' Arms

Lisa has been here four years now, and as well as maintaining good cask ale the pub food obviously has a good reputation, with special offers at lunchtime. Sharp's Doom Bar is the regular ale here, with a guest ale, and I've enjoyed both the Ascot Gold Cup and Wye Valley HPA on separate occasions. Nice to see Staropramen and Birra Moretti among the lagers available on draught – more to my taste than some others when we get some hot weather! Also good for musical entertainment every Sunday from 5-7pm, live bands on the last Saturday of each month, and 'Open Mic' on the 1st Monday of each month. There are also occasional comedy nights too – something for everyone! **DF**

Kings Arms

Mark and Sarah have been at this Greene King pub for well over 10 years now, I reckon, and made it altogether much tidier than I recall in the past. The

cask ales seem to have been reduced to just the IPA for the moment, at least, but it's been consistently good on recent visits. The pub is part of the 'Hungry Horse' range, so has competitively-priced food and drinks, as well as Sports TVs, etc., and social events – overall, a popular spot! Opens for breakfasts at 8am, and the bar at 11. **Doug Fish**

Three Mariners

Good to see Barry still in charge, and evidently keeps this characterful pub in good order. The four cask ales on in recent weeks have been Fuller's London Pride, Harvey's Sussex Best, Courage Best, and Timothy Taylor Landlord – an excellent range, I reckon, and kept in good nick. Opens 11-11 Mon-Sat, with food 12-1030. Sun. opens 12-1030, with food 12-9. **DF**

BETCHWORTH

Dolphin

The Dolphin is a Young's pub and is featured in CAMRAs Real Heritage Pubs of the South East guide. There is also a large tented area outside the pub adding more space. As well as Young's own beers, an excellent pint of Surrey Hills Shere Drop is served. **Roy Golding**

BLACKWATER

Mr Bumble

It was a pleasure to award Philippa with another year's recognition for having been included in CAMRA's current Good Beer Guide, helped by 'cellar-man' Keith. They maintain four cask ales here, the regular one being Fuller's London Pride and the others mainly from nearby Ascot Brewing Company (actually in Camberley!), and Windsor & Eton, also sometimes from elsewhere. The pub is also noted for live bands every Saturday evening, with 'Open Mic' nights on Thursdays, and other live music on Fridays – a popular spot, to be sure! Opens at midday. **DF**

BROCKHAM

Taphouse

This free house is situated in what was the middle part of the village club. A mezzanine floor adds more seating room. There are usually two cask beers on sale from local breweries such as Surrey Hills and Firebird. **RG**

CAMBERLEY

Bear

For the moment, at least, Sully has maintained the large canvas extension in front of the pub (which enabled more customers to be accommodated during the days of 'one-way systems' and 2-metre spacing) and this worked out well. Glad to see that he's maintained two cask ales – Fuller's London Pride, and St Austell Tribute, various draught lagers, and a range of assorted beers in the fridges, including some high-octane Belgian ones! The food range is very popular and live music has been restored on Thursday evenings, starting at 8.30. Opens Mon-Fri 12-11, Sat 11-12, Sun. 12-1030. **DF**

Cabin

In 2017 "Sparks" and a few friends decided to set up a new bar in a retail outlet for sale along the London Road and set about this, creating an imaginary 'log cabin', with numerous eccentric touches such as musical instruments and vinyl LPs attached to the walls and an old bicycle or two. Recent additions have included numerous paintings exhibited by customers. On Sunday afternoons they also feature blues-based groups or 'Open Mic' sessions, and vinyl records on Wednesday evenings, when people often bring their own to share with others. Basically, very different from other bars and loved by many now 'regulars', who enjoy the general atmosphere here and, of course, the extensive range of drinks, including six types of coffee! No cask ale here, but a large range of bottled beers and my CAMRA colleagues enjoyed it when I included The Cabin on a recent pub crawl'. Closed on Mondays for 'recovery purposes' but open Tues-Thurs 5-11, Fri 5-12, Sat 2-12, and Sun 2-10-ish. **DF**

Carpenters Arms

This is a Greene King pub managed by Ben for several years now, and he generally has a guest ale on to supplement the IPA and/or Abbot. Recently had an excellent pint or three of Timothy Taylor Landlord, and Twickenham beers are often on too. He's happy to give card-carrying CAMRA members a discount on their cask ales, as are most Greene King managed pubs. The food range is very popular here, as are the Sports TVs, particularly for football and cricket fans. I've heard some excellent live bands here too and although it's quite a small area some of us even have a 'bop', especially after a few beers! Opens Mon-Sat 11-11, Sun. 12-1030. **DF**

Claude du Vall

Paul continues here as the Manager, and no wonder, as it was great to be able to present him with yet another year's recognition in CAMRA's Good Beer Guide – congrats, Paul! It's amazing how

Wetherspoon pubs maintain such low prices, not only for drinks but also for their food range - no wonder they're popular! Most readers will already be aware of this, but it takes considerable effort to keep the range in good condition – as well as regular ales such as Sharp's Doom Bar, Ruddles Best Bitter, and Greene King Abbot they normally have three or four guest ales, and beer festivals several times each year. Long may 'Spoons' continue! **DF**

Crabtree

Amy has been here now for over 15 years – obviously well thought of by Mitchells & Butlers, as well as her staff and regular customers! The pub is spacious and well-furnished inside, with plenty of seating outside, too and a considerable parking area. There are several cask ales on here, generally including Fuller's London Pride, St Austell Tribute, and Black Sheep Twiligher, and they give a discount to card-carrying CAMRA members for a pint of cask ale. It's also a popular place for lunchtime and evening food, which is competitively priced, especially on Thursdays, when steaks are discounted! Quiz Nights on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Carry on, please, Amy! **DF**

CHERTSEY

Coach & Horses

Licensee Claire Trinder is heading for a well-deserved retirement at the end of March, after running the pub for over 30 years. Bev Busby, who has been bar manager for seven years, will take on the tenancy from April. The permanent offering of Fuller's London Pride and ESB will be joined by a guest ale changing on a monthly basis. **Anthony Groves**

Crown

Young's Original available all week round, with St Austell Proper Job joining it at weekends. **AG**

Olde Swan

The Swan now has two guest ale lines, as Timothy Taylor Landlord has given way to a further range of guest ales. These accompany Tring Side Pocket for a Toad and Sharp's Doom Bar. Recent visits have found Exmoor Gold, Box Steam Soul Train, Dark Star Hophead, Titsey Gresham Hopper and Milestone Black Pearl on – great to have a pale and a stout as guests side-by-side. The Resumption Of Grumpy's Annual Calender



Now that there is some sort of return to normality I was reminded how many of my groans fit in to the annual sequence of events. It was late October and that dreadful event called 'trick or treat' was upon us. I always avoid this by going out and not being disrupted every couple of minutes by children demanding chocolate to fuel their obesity. In the case of the older ones, it can be made worse by demands for money or even alcohol with rejection greeted by eggs and flour thrown. A friend of mine has an industrial water pistol to give them a real trick, but I wouldn't dare and therefore escape to the safety of the pub. It was quiet and headed towards my usual territory which was already occupied by a couple and a young child. The child was quiet and well behaved, but taking no chances I ventured further away. For once, I made the right decision as no sooner than seated that the child 'kicked off' standing on the seat and basically screaming which went on and on. Eventually, the parents gave up trying to calm him and took the responsible action to leave. Shortly afterwards, small groups of adults and children started to form and they were obviously planning to go on manoeuvres for 'trick or treating'. The kids were approximation of zombies or other horror figures apart from one little girl who was dressed as a fairy complete with a wand which was a little bizarre! They were planning their strategy of 'attack'. When I left later I witnessed them in operation, systematically 'combing' the streets like a modern style industrial Fagin style operation. I was reminded of a beer festival where the charity organisers told their volunteers to walk four feet apart at the same pace and when they reached the far end to repeat the process, but having changed positions so as punters would encounter different faces. This was hardly entering into the spirit of things and they were not invited back again.

Next there is Christmas and the problem of Christmas Day. Generally, the pubs are only open for a couple of hours at lunchtime, but become full of family groups whose last visit to the pub was the previous Christmas day. Inevitably, regulars are pushed aside and getting served was chaotic. A family order comprising beer, miscellaneous spirits, wine and children's soft drinks combined with the interruptions of asking Auntie Flo what type of sherry she required. Inevitably, all of this produced much mess engulfing the tables. Sadly, some years ago a 12% winter beer was available and virtually everyone was trying a half as it was Christmas. This beer had taken months to mature and it was largely left untouched which would have brought tears to the eyes of the brewer. How sad and so unnecessary! This year it was regulars only and their dogs and a far better atmosphere resulted. At least visitor's children were not able to feed the dogs mince pies!

Throughout the lockdowns and other interruptions, I thought that landlords were generally a professional in their approach despite being provoked by many an idiot trying to get around the regulations. Unfortunately, such high standards were not always evident in the past. In my younger days I remember entering to hang up our coats only to be told that they were flea and moth ridden and m only fit for his dog to lie on. He also suggested that we move to the other bar so as not to upset the locals. Throughout the 1970's long male hair was fashionable which infuriated many landlords and especially those with a military background. If you dared not to ask where the toilets were or you might well get the response questioning whether you needed the male or female toilets. Even worse, one landlord asked a customer to check that the toilets were not being used as he feared that other customers might think that they were being propositioned. There were two

landlords who were so elitist that it was a wonder that they had any customers at all. The first was a large Polish man who I asked to stamp my pub trail passport. He held this document as if it was a piece of used loo paper and was concerned that the proletarian hordes would descend upon him. He made it clear that he did not want the riff-raff contaminating his establishment, but eventually signed with a pretentious moniker covering the whole passport and then threw it back at me. The second was a South Africa who had been put in this pub to tidy up the clientele. He certainly did that, but with his attitude cleared out most sensible people with his rules and regulations. When I entered it was empty with Sibelius playing played at full blast. I told how nice it was to hear the Sibelius, but in reply he told me that if I didn't like it I should get out. Three possibilities present themselves.

1. He misheard and thought I was being critical

2. Nobody likes a clever dick which I was obviously being.
3. He had had put himself on an elitist pedestal and resented oiks like myself joining him.

Anyway, I was thrown out leaving the pub empty which is what his attitude and music deserved.

Finally, there is some excitement to look forward to with the imminent kid's half term. Kids in pubs is becoming more and more reminiscent of those old black and white films where the wagon train forms a circle and is surrounded by yelping Indians. The circle is now formed by the pushchairs with the kids doing the yelping supplemented by the older kids with their scooters. If that is not enough excitement there is always Mothering Sunday to look forward to and a no-go day for the pub.

Loch Fyne

Cobbett's

As business has improved in this bottle shop and micropub it has extended its opening on Friday night till 8:30pm (this is closing time, there is no drinking up time). There are between one and three cask beers available with the higher number being found at the end of the week. There are also six keykegs, three ciders and a large number of bottles and cans. The quality of the draught beers is invariably excellent. **RG**

Cricketers

Recently the guest beers in this Fuller's pub has included Big Smoke Solaris, Dark Star Nordland, Thornbridge Jaipur and Wild Beer Bibble alongside the regulars Dark Star Hophead, Fuller's London Pride and Fuller's ESB, Monthly quiz nights started again in February. The pub is closed on Mondays. **RG**

Falkland Arms

This now belongs to Punch since they bought the pubs which were part of the Ram Pub Company owned by Young's. Locally they now also own The Old House in Dorking and the Royal Oak, Stonebridge. **RG**

Queen's Head

This pub was been named Fuller's Pub of the Year at a ceremony on Thursday 1st December 2021. The licensee, Manu Bhatt has only been at the Queen's Head since February 2020, arriving shortly before the first Covid lockdown. Since he arrived a large teepee in the garden has extended the space available for dining. The beers available are usually Dark Star Hophead, Fuller's London Pride and a guest beer from Fuller's list. **RG**

EAST MOLESEY

LJ's (formerly Gallery 84)

Has reopened but does not sell any real ale. **JN**

EFFINGHAM

Sir Douglas Haig (Queen Stage)

A planning application to retain the pub but build

additional housing, an office and garage on the site of the coach house, following its demolition, was approved in February. The pub is due to reopen as the Queen Stage on 23rd March, a café-bar, geared towards catering for cyclists and providing them with food and accommodation. **KT**

EGHAM

United Services Club

A constantly changing range of guest real ales, from breweries far and wide, always including a stout/porter. The next Egham Beer & Cider Festival will be held at Easter from Thursday 14th to Saturday 16th April. **AG**

ELSTEAD

Royal British Legion Club

Barley Mow

Idyllic setting overlooking the village green. Sharp's Doom Bar, St Austell Tribute, Windsor & Eton's Knight of the Garter and Guardsman on. **RS**

Beehive

Fuller's London Pride and Dark Star Hophead on. **RS**

Fox & Hounds

Another good food destination with a real ale offering. Hobgoblin Gold (although this will change back soon to Breakspear's Oxford Gold after there being supply issues) and A Fox's Tale (rebadged Ringwood Razorback). **RS**

Happy Man

Tring Citra, Purity Pure Gold, Exeter Darkness and Ferryman found on a recent visit. Constantly changing

range of good quality ales, supplemented by great food. **RS**

EPSOM**Café Rouge**

Has been converted to Cappadocia, a Turkish restaurant, having closed due to the collapse of the Cafe Rouge owning company. **JN**

FARNHAM**Sit and Sip**

A planning application has been submitted as part of the Brightwell development in Farnham for the inclusion of a new Sit and Sip outlet on the site. Sit and Sip is a small chain of boutique lounge bars and bottle shops, which typically sell a range of microbrewery keg beers and bottles as well as artisan gins to drink in and take away. Other sites already exist in Chichester, Horsham and Wokingham. **KT**

FLEET**Hart House**

The Hart House reopened in November 2021 as a light and airy gastropub leased by Portobello Brewery. Sadly none of their real ales are available, try the Prince Arthur over the road, though there is a selection of their beers on keg and in bottle. Whilst there is a strong food focus, there is an area to drink without dining at the front of the pub. **KT**

GODALMING**Sun**

The Sun has been sold by Hall and Woodhouse. It now sells Sharp's Doom Bar, Timothy Taylor, Landlord and Fuller's London Pride, a Marston's dray was spotted outside this week! **David Monger**

A new Micro-pub

Waverley Borough Council have approved a planning application to convert a former florist in the town centre into a micro-pub. It is not yet known if and when the micro-pub will open. **KT**

KINGSTON**Cornerstone**

Remains shut with no sign of reopening after closing for the first Covid lockdown in March 2020. **JN**

KNAPHILL**Crown**

Now re-opened despite there still being scaffolding at the front of the pub. At last visit only had one real ale on that was Hogs Back TEA on. Food currently

includes Sunday roasts with plans to soon sell Spanish Tapas. **Brian Bourne**

Garibaldi

Had an excellent pint of Box Steam Soul Train. The other beer on was Otter Amber from Otter Brewery. The tent in the car park has now gone and has reverted to being a car park. **BB**

Royal Oak

The beers on during visit were Adnams Ghost Ship and an excellent pint of Windsor & Eton Last Drop. A number of real ciders are available. Looking forward to the warmer weather to make use of the much improved garden area. **BB**

LEATHERHEAD**Dukes Head**

Closed again in December only two months after reopening; a new tenant is being sought. Greene King had indicated that this Grade II listed pub would reopen again by the end of January, but it was still firmly shut on 5th February. **JN**

LEIGH**Seven Stars**

Excellent food is served at this attractive old pub. The beer quality is also of a very high standard with Fuller's London Pride being sold along with Surrey Hills Ranmore and Shere Drop. **RG**

LYNE**Royal Marine**

Slightly eccentric but welcoming little pub tucked away in a small village off the beaten track. Check opening times before visiting! Greene King IPA and Ruddles Best on cask. **RS/AG**

MICKLEHAM**Running Horses**

Has taken over by the team behind the Queen's Head in Dorking. Whilst some of the previous beer range remains, Surrey Hills beers have also made a welcome appearance. **JN**

MINDENHURST**Frog at Mindenfurst**

Construction work began in July 2021 for a new pub as part of the Mindenhurst development at Deepcut. The pub will be a managed Hall & Woodhouse pub and is due to open later in the Spring. The name takes its inspiration from an adjacent pond and will be located on the corner of Brunswick Road overlooking the lake and village green. **KT**

Pub Companies

Who they are and what they do



2. THE CURRENT PUB COMPANY SCENE

A pub company is simply a company that owns pubs and there are literally hundreds of them, many with only a handful or even just one pub. We'll concentrate here, though, on the bigger companies who, between them, own over half the country's pubs.

STONEGATE

Founded in 2010 with the purchase of 333 pubs from Mitchells & Butlers, Stonegate grew quite slowly over the next ten years, making a series of acquisitions including brands like Slug & Lettuce, Walkabout and Be At One, until its pub numbers totalled 765. All the pubs were managed houses. A seismic change came in 2020 when Ei Group was bought for £1.27bn, making Stonegate the largest pub company in the UK with 1,270 managed pubs and, as a result of the Ei purchase, 3,200 leased and tenanted businesses.

Ei itself had been founded, as Enterprise Inns, in 1991, initially with 333 pubs from Bass. The company built up its estate, gaining 2,200 pubs in batches by buying them from other companies or taking them over. In 2002, 1,864 pubs were bought from Whitbread and in 2004, 4,054 from Unique. By this time, it owned nearly 10,000 pubs and was in the FTSE 100 list of top companies. However, it was loaded with debt and the 2008 financial crash required a good deal of retrenchment. Ei also started building up its managed estate, including pubs on retail agreements under the Craft Union brand (we'll look at this operating model in the next article). By the time of the sale, it was down to fewer than 4,000 pubs.

PUNCH TAVERNS

The first article included a brief history of Punch to illustrate the volatility around pubco development. In summary, it grew quickly to

around 8,000 pubs, suffered under the crash, sold a lot of pubs including its managed division and was taken over in 2016. 1,900 pubs went to Heineken and 1,300 to Patron Capital, who retain the Punch brand. At takeover time, all pubs were leased or tenanted but it's also now pushing retail agreements (which it calls Management Partnerships). Some pubs were sold but in June 2021 it announced the purchase of Youngs' tenanted division, bringing the current total to 1,282.

ADMIRAL TAVERNS

Admiral was founded in 2003 by two families and grew quickly to 2,300 pubs by 2007. Many of these were 'bottom end' houses disposed of by other pub companies. The financial crash had the usual consequences for over-extended businesses and numbers were down to 1,700 by 2011 and continued to fall. By 2017 it was in the hands of Cerberus Capital Management who sold up to a joint venture by Magners cider-makers C&C Group and estate investor Proprium Capital Partners, by which time there were 845 pubs. The acquisition trail was hit in 2019 with 137 pubs coming from Marstons and 150 from Heineken. The big one arrived in July 2021 when Admiral bought 674 Hawthorn pubs from property firm New River taking the estate to over 1,500.

Admiral's pubs are all tenanted or leased and tend to be wet-led community operations. It has a relatively good reputation in the trade though there's certainly no aversion to flogging off pubs as 'development opportunities'.

STAR PUBS & BARS

In 1995, Scottish & Newcastle, one of the original 'Big Six' breweries, bought another of them, Courage, making the combined group Britain's biggest brewer. By 2011, the pub arm, then known as S&N Pub Co, had 1,500

tenanted pubs and 600 in management. Come 2008, Scottish Courage was gobbled up by international brewer Heineken and the pub business rebranded as Star Pubs & Bars. Many pubs were sold but then, in 2017, as previously mentioned, 1,900 were snapped up from Punch. Again there were disposals and the estate currently stands at 2,500.

Star vigorously promote their retail agreement scheme, Just Add Talent. In 2020, it was fined £2m for breaches of the Pubs Code (which we'll cover in a later article)

GREENE KING

In 1995, Greene King was a long-established family brewer with 900 pubs, nearly all in East Anglia and the South-East. It then embarked on a ferocious acquisition trail, swallowing up many breweries (the likes of Morlands, Belhaven, Morrells and Hardy & Hanson) and other pub companies. GK itself is now owned by a billionaire Hong Kong property developer. It has some 3,100 pubs, restaurants and hotels, of which 1,200 are tenanted or leased. Its strategy seems to be to move in the managed direction and the 'Pub Ready' retail agreements are pushed hard. GK was once renowned for not letting other people's beers in its pubs but now have a more enlightened attitude.

MARSTON'S

The company was known as Wolverhampton & Dudley until 2007 when it rebranded as Marston's, one of the many breweries it had taken over in recent years. At that time, 2,500 pubs were owned but the total is now down to 1,400. The tenanted estate, in particular, has been reduced through sales such as 200 to New River in 2013 and 137 to Admiral in 2019. In late 2020, the company took on the running of 156 Brains pubs in Wales. Also that year, Marston's merged its brewing operations with Carlsberg but this does not directly affect the pub business.

MITCHELLS AND BUTLERS

Formed originally out of the old Bass estate, M&B have 1,650 pubs and restaurants. The multitudinous brands include Ember Inns, Toby Carveries, Nicholsons and All Bar One – as can be seen, the emphasis is on food. Pubs are mostly managed though around 50 are on a lease arrangement.

J D WETHERSPOON

Since opening its first pub in 1979, 'Spoons has expanded to 925 pubs and 50 hotels, all managed. Plans for 18 new pubs are in the pipeline,

WELLINGTON

Owned by the billionaire Reuben Brothers, the company leases all its 850 pubs on a free of tie basis.

Having been in operation since 2016, lockdown made the brewery realise they had to diversify their outlet markets to survive and grow. Running a six-barrel plant, they brew once or twice a week and are currently concentrating on three core ales - a 4.8% pale, a 5% red IPA and a Kolsch-style ale. Plans are afoot to add an amber and a golden ale to the core range, to be supplemented by a range of seasonal brews throughout the year. All tend to be in the 4% to 5% range as Marc Sage from the brewery likes 'a good backbone' to his beers.



Production is roughly equal into cask and cans, with a small amount into keg.

Canning has switched from 330ml to 440ml eye-catching cans and they can be found at farmers' markets in West Byfleet on the last Saturday and Weybridge on the first Sunday of each month. Cask ales have featured at a number of beer festivals around the area over the last six months and have been well received. **Anthony Groves**

Due to circumstances and consumer concerns, December sales in the trade and in the BreweryTap were slow in line with many other brewers and the hospitality sector as a whole.

However, Christmas trade in the Brewery Shop was brisk, with good footfall, and many people taking advantage of the Click & Collect service. There was a marked increase in demand for Home Delivery services in the run up to Christmas. Lots of fresh beer was ordered, including Christmas cask specials, Advent and Mistletoe & Swine. Sales of reusable glass

flagons, Snorters and Snifters, continue to grow as more consumers see the benefit in terms of the beer and sustainability. Brewery Tours were well supported and more tours have been opened up due to demand. January and February are traditionally slow months, but the brewery is hoping that the spring will bring people back to the pubs and to the Brewery Tap.

There will be a number of limited edition ales this year. The first is England's Glory, which launches in order to coincide with the Six Nations rugby. The limited edition programme will be finalised as part of the Budget planning process ahead of the start of the fiscal year in April. This will definitely include Friday 13th in May and Green TEA when hops are harvested in September. The Brewery Tap is continuing to grow. There has been a limited make-over to make it more comfortable. A new kitchen is now open and there is a new menu, which is being continuously developed. A marquee has gone up in front of the Tap room, and now houses the pizza oven. A number of events have been run in the Tap room, including live music in December, a HOG-manay celebration on New Year's Eve and a special Burns Night, complete with haggis, bagpipes and a ceilidh. A charity quiz to raise funds for The Therapy Garden in Normandy took place in early February, plus a Tongham TEA Club tasting of England's Glory as well as showing the rugby live on the big screen. The full 2022 programme of events is being finalised and the next events will be advertised soon. (See the brewery web site) A major event for the brewery was the presentation by CAMRA for the champion bottled beer of Britain for A over T on 15th November 2022, attended by both members of the local branch, headquarters staff and of course brewery staff. Well done indeed. **Peter Hayward**

MAVERICK, Farnham



Maverick has still not found premises and is therefore not yet in production. Most recently two potential properties were considered, one just outside Farnham where the owner did not wish to invest money to bring the buildings to a lettable condition, the other in the town centre where the owner now has permission to install offices at an upper level. In addition to this there is now permission to build a complex of new homes adjacent and opposite the buildings which would make licensing very difficult or impossible. Maverick continues to look and is waiting for the market to turn up further potential properties. Given this extremely drawn out situation, Maverick is considering how and when to return the crowd funding monies and

then possibly running a new campaign if a suitable property is found. **Chris Truin**

The beers available on a recent visit were Timothy Taylor Landlord, Harvey's Sussex Best and Sharp's Doom Bar. The front car park has been reduced in size to provide more outside drinking area. Does a very good Sunday Roast. **BB**

Victoria

Has changed ownership and has had a major makeover but remains very food oriented. Changing beers are sourced via Asahi. **JN**

SHALFORD

Queen Victoria

Looking great and welcoming and was also pleasingly busy for a cold January evening. There were two beers available, the ubiquitous Sharp's Doom Bar and Greene King IPA. **CMK**

To Farnham Lions

The Farnham Lions Club, in partnership with CAMRA and the Farnham Maltings Association have run Farnham Beerex for 45 years, since it started in 1977; it is the longest running beer festival in the country to have been held at the same location throughout.

The event is the major fundraising event for the local charities supported by the Farnham Lions. Staffed by well over 300 volunteers, all of whom are unpaid, it's a truly unique event that is firmly fixed in the town's social diary.

Held in Farnham, Surrey, the first Beerex took place in 1977, six years after CAMRA had been established, as a means of promoting traditional cask-conditioned beers from British breweries in line with CAMRA's aims, whilst raising money for charity. The concept was the idea of two CAMRA members who were also members of the Farnham Lions Club, inspired by CAMRA's Covent Garden Beer Festival (London) of 1975. Originally planned as a one-off event, until Covid intervened it has taken place every year since at the Farnham Maltings in late April or early May, still organised by the same three organisations and staffed entirely by unpaid volunteers.

The event has raised in excess of £900,000 for mainly local charities and good causes through the Lions Club of Farnham and has been instrumental in raising awareness of traditional beers in the Farnham area which can now boast a number of independent breweries including the long-established Hogs Back Brewery.

The Farnham Lions are worthy recipients of this prestigious award and current Lions Chairman Keith Harris was presented with a certificate to mark the occasion in March at a planning meeting for this years Festival, which is again taking place at Farnham Maltings between 7th and 9th April.

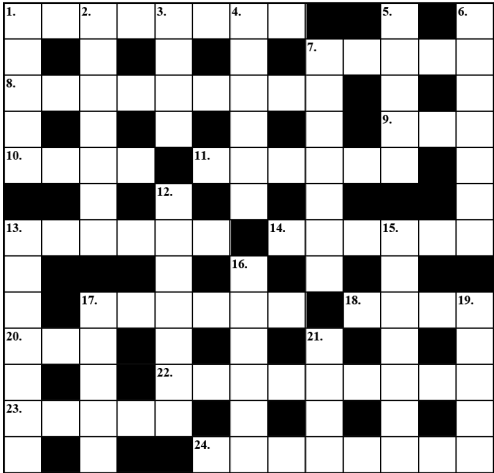

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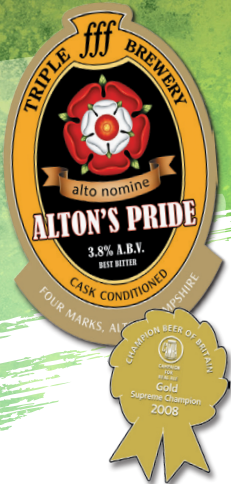
